


The estination Edito Flaine began from a meeting between Marcel Breuer, a key figure in Modernism and the Bauhaus movement, and a French Summary couple, Monsieur and Madame Boissonnas, Ardent lovers of the mountains, architecture and design, they shared an irrepressible desire to collaborate in the creation of a mountain destination. From their partnership emerged a common goal to break with tradition by imagining somewhere that would combine skiing and nature, culture and relaxation; an urban planning prototype which would become a new model for mountain architecture. They laid the foundations for what would, many years later, become the resort of Flaine: The ski area a place designed to break with tradition. Since then, Flaine has provoked strong Ski runs reactions. Flaine has a 13,500-bed capacity, bolstered by a varied, adapted accommodation offer that's segmented between the needs of its national and international clientele. Its goal is to reach a million overnight stays in winter, and summer combined.

Flaine demonstrates remarkable results in marketing its tourist beds. Increased occupancy rates, both in winter and in summer, reflect the resort's tourist appeal, the auality of its offer, and the relevance of its positioning.



Le Grand Massif is a group of five resorts, each with its own distinct and complementary identity: Flaine, bold and contemporary; Les Carroz, welcoming and familyfriendly; Morillon, the definition of village life; Samoëns, naturally charming; and Sixt-Fer-à-Cheval, tucked

away and unspoiled. Located close to Geneva, the ski area offers exceptional panoramic views over the Mont Blanc massif for a varied, authentic snowsports

experience.

Ski-in/ski-out

As well as being the most varied, Le Grand Massif is the 4th largest interconnected "ski-in/ski-out" ski area in France. Between altitudes of 700 and 2,500 metres, 62 ski lifts provide access to 139 ski runs, forming a 265 kilometre playground of slopes adapted to suit every ability, featuring downhill forest runs, beginners' zones, fun zones and dedicated freeride sectors.

Snow guarantee

In Flaine, snow cover is hardly even a question. Thanks to a particularly favourable geographical location, the resort is regularly among those with **the most snow in France**. Its north-west orientation and sheltered position at the foot of high mountains help it to retain precipitation and maintain low temperatures, both of which are conducive to snow. As a result, the resort is often one of the earliest to have snow in winter, maintaining constant snow cover until spring, enhanced by a network of around a hundred snowmakers should they be required.

Mont Blanc at the end of your ski tips

As you disembark from the cable car, the Grandes Platières balcony offers a unique viewpoint over "the Lord of the Alps". Just by turning your head, you can take in a 360° view over the Mont Blanc, Aravis, Belledonne and Jura massifs. The cable car makes this spectacle accessible to skiers and pedestrians.



Beginners love it

Beginners of all ages will find plenty to enjoy on specially dedicated areas in the heart of the resort. **4 free lifts**, including 3 covered magic carpets (Pré, Michalet and Bissac) and 1 gondola lift are available **free of charge** welcoming beginners to learn and improve. **3 dedicated sectors** have also been set up in the safe areas of Pré and Bissac, where skiers can learn at their own pace, before gradually progressing onto the other green runs via the Ballacha drag lift.

4, 3, 2, 1 Go!

With 4 access routes out of the resort centre (Grands Vans chairlift, Grandes Platières cable car, Tête des Verds chairlift, and Aup de Véran gondola lift) you can reach the top of the slopes without any morning traffic jams!

Ski against the flow

There's nothing quite like the thrill of leaving your tracks on untouched ski runs from the moment the lifts open.

In Flaine, smart skiers head to the Aup de Véran gondola lift and over to the Aujon sector first thing in the morning. Then, the journey continues east to west across the ski area, reaching the Grands Vans chairlift by mid-morning, which is the perfect time to head towards Les Carroz, Morillon or Samoëns, travelling in the opposite direction to the crowds making their way up from these very resorts. Around 3pm, the return journey to Flaine gently begins.

Or to keep the fun going a little longer, hardcore skiers can return to their favourite runs, which have often emptied out by then, for a peaceful way to round off their ski day.



Flaine, the ultimate playgroundFrom smooth rides to thrilling slopes

Flaine's **64** ski runs invite skiers to explore its generous landscapes and discover the joys of a range of snowsports. From downhill skiing to freeride and freestyle, snowsports fans will love gliding along the naturally rolling terrain over a huge variety of long, playful runs, which are known for always being perfectly groomed. While the majority of runs provide wonderful opportunities for fast stress-free turns, others with more sustained gradients and narrower sections require a certain level of physical fitness and skill.







The most immersive in nature: Cascades

The Cascades red run is every skier's dream... Accessible from the top of Grandes Platières cable car, this 14km run snaking through the Sixt-Fer-à-Cheval nature reserve lets you treat yourself to a magical snowsports experience in the heart of nature. This 1,720-metre descent that gives you the satisfaction of being able to enjoy almost an hour of skiing, with the added bonus of not having to take a single ski lift to interrupt the fun. Your thighs will certainly know about it, but your heart will be brimming with joy!

Info: free shuttlebus as far as Samoëns, with a skibus every 20 minutes then via ski lifts – Allow approximately 3 hours for the round trip. Grand Massif skipass required.

The most challenging: La Combe de Gers

Tucked away, this black run keeps its secrets well-hidden, only revealing them to those who venture onto the little path bypassing the Tête Pelouse, and thus into this paradise. There, **a fabulous, ungroomed ski area** awaits, perfect for freeriders and fans of steep slopes, with over 800 metres of vertical drop. Its northern exposure makes it ideal territory for powder days, while its southern slopes are unrivalled in spring! And as challenging as the descent is, the climb back up on the drag lift of the same name is every bit as demanding! Experienced skiers will love conquering this multi-faceted run with a reputation to match.



The most beautiful view: Méphisto Sup

This beautiful red run starts at the top of Grandes Platières. Its first turns wind gently around with **Mont Blanc in the background**, before the Beaufortain and Oisans peaks make an appearance after a series of bends. Then, the atmosphere shifts as a wild mountain pass takes you over to the Aup de Véran sector with a steeper gradient and vertiginous views of Flaine below.

The most peaceful: the Aujon blue runs

Located on the north face of Aup de Véran, the Aujon sector offers **peaceful skiing far from the madding crowd**. Its 3 blue runs are served by a drag lift that winds between Alpine chalets. The final stretch through the forest only adds to the sense of tranquillity.

The most playful: Serpentine

Boasting 7 kilometres of snowsports enjoyment, Platières' famous blue Serpentine run invites you to be at one with the slopes as you carve wide turns in the sunshine. Highly popular with skiers of all levels, it offers a **breath-taking panorama of the entire resort**. Along the Véret mountainside that edges the majority of the run, skiers may spot local wildlife; ibex, chamois goats and mountain hares are all regulars in the area!



A different viewpoint: Opale green run

Setting off from the top of the Gérats chairlift, the green Opale run is a favourite among pleasure seekers. First, there's nothing like a snack break or something more substantial if you're so inclined over at the picnic area. Once you've refuelled, set off on a peaceful ski with views over Flaine. Overlooking Flaine Forêt, you'll see a different view from the one you're used to, making you feel as though you are part of the scenery. A gentle immersion, on skis, inside the mind of Marcel Breuer.

What's on Flaine, where experiences come alive Curated activities to enrich every moment beyond skiing For a wealth of fun things to do or to liven up an evening, Flaine offers a number of activities including snowsports, thrills, spectacular shows and contemplative excursions, with something to suit everybody.







Spectacular drone displays

This has become Flaine's **UNMISSABLE** eagerly awaited **show**, with its popularity extending way beyond the snow front and onto social media. True to its pioneering image, in December 2021 Flaine was the first ski resort in the Alps to put on a spectacular show using 40 drones during the French school holidays. This winter, the resort is setting its standards even higher, by using **200 drones** instead of 150 last year. In December, the skies will be lit up in a thousand colours, with beautiful Christmas and New Year-themed shows, whilst the February theme remains a surprise...

Driving a dog sled team

With Évasion Nordique, you can try your hand at driving a dog sled team in Les Molliets! After a briefing by a qualified instructor, each participant takes the reins of their own sled, pulled by 3 or 4 Siberian huskies. The activity involves a combination of technique, dog-handling, and total immersion in nature. With turns, climbs and descents, learn how to control your dogs' exertion, guide your team and relish in this unique, environmentally friendly snowsport. A range of packages is available, from one-hour taster sessions to full-day sessions for 4 to 5 people.

Mountain Kart

Trail running on snow

Fancy running through the snow? The Col de Pierre Carrée is home to **3 circuits** inviting trail runners to discover stunning views over the Arve valley and the Combe de Vernant forests. Although the routes are fairly easy (3 to 6 kilometres long with very little altitude difference), you can challenge yourself to a timed run! You will find these challenges on the "Flaine Les Carroz Espace outdoor" app, with your GPS and Bluetooth enabled, and timing points located along the route keep track of your time too!

Moon biking

With caterpillar tracks at the rear for increased lift, and a blade at the front for greater manoeuvrability, this is an ultra-modern and environmentally friendly alternative to the snowmobile. With an electric engine and **zero carbon emissions**, you can explore nature respectfully without making a sound. Whether you prefer riding through the snow-covered forests to get away from the hustle and bustle, or hurtling down the slopes in search of new snowsports thrills, anything's possible on a guided moon biking session.

The largest snow and ice driving track in France!

The experience of driving on ice or snow is a lot like that of skiing, accelerating, braking, turning sharply this way and that, skidding, taking corners... The most "arty": 3-star Totem Friendly Hotel

Set in the heart of Flaine Forum, the Totem is a lively, welcoming place to stay, where the focus is firmly on shared experiences. A vast reception area, set against the backdrop of raw concrete, as designed by Marcel Breuer, is softened by chestnut-oak furniture, with the eye drawn to colourful fabrics and ethnic designs. In the stairwells, street art takes the reins with graphic murals paying homage to the resort creators and to Flaine's artistic heritage, in dialogue with modernist architecture and contemporary urban expression. In addition to its 96 sixties-style bedrooms, the hotel restaurant boasts delicious gourmet dishes, a bar with a lounge and fireplace, a panoramic terrace, Pure Altitude spa with an outdoor Jacuzzi, saunas and a well-being area, as well as a ski shop.

The 4-star hotel boasts **a wealth of practical and original services**, including an XXL lobby bar with games and karaoke rooms, several restaurants, a grocery, meeting rooms, Nuxe spa and pool... as well as 118 bedrooms and apartments for 2 to 10 people. Far from the stereotypical mountain decor, everything is saturated in bright colours and Pop Art accessories, creating **a fun, chic atmosphere**.

The most "architectural": 4-star Hôtel Club MMV Le Flaine – Holiday Village

The resort's iconic Le Flaine hotel is a distillation of Marcel Breuer's genius. The fireplace he designed enjoys an eyecatching location in the middle of the cosy lounge, which extends out onto a hanging terrace, one of the designer's more daring signature works of art. 72 spacious bedrooms and family suites boast a high level of comfort and the perfect blend of colours and materials. The après-ski, buffets and themed dinners round off the feeling of total fulfilment, whilst the spa offers moments of sheer relaxation.

The most "ski-in/ski-out": Alhéna MGM Hôtels & Résidences

In an ideal location just a stone's throw from the Forum and a short ski from the top of the Grandes Platières cable car and ski lesson meeting point, both accommodation options feature **spacious rooms** and **top-of-the-range facilities**. The boldly architectural, stripped back 4-star hotel boasts 37 rooms and suites ranging from 30 to 130 m², with quality, sustainable materials in harmony with the colours and fabrics. Large spaces and moments to share are also on the menu at the 4-star residence, with 40 generously sized, functionally designed apartments for 4 to 8 people. And completing the picture at both, a restaurant, lounge with fireplace and bar, well-being area that extends over 1000 m², and a Spa Montagnes du Monde® with an indoor heated swimming pool, sauna, steam room, and hot tub round off the facilities at these two establishments.

Listed as a 20th century architectural heritage site, Flaine is much more than just a ski resort. It wasn't built to follow fashion but was created to meet the need to bring sustainability, quality and utility to architecture while also reducing costs and construction time. The result of a great deal of thought, it is culturally rich, naturally surprising and quite simply in a league of its own!







Façades sculpted by light

In Flaine, the architecture comes to life with the rhythm of the sun. Designed by Marcel Breuer, the diamond point facades constitute one of the resort's most striking visual signatures. Cut from prefabricated concrete and standing on foundations made from locally quarried Sixt stone, they're part of a constant interplay between shadows and reflections. "The architecture of Flaine is an example of the application of the principle of shadow and light that I have adopted", explains Breuer. "The sun strikes every facet differently, creating a landscape of movement throughout the day."

The Ecumenical Chapel - architecture that stands apart

Inaugurated in 1973 and listed, along with its furnishings, as an **Historic Monument** since 2014, Flaine's Ecumenical Chapel's unique architecture sets it apart. Unlike the other buildings in the resort, the chapel is not made of concrete, but wood and slate. Resort architect Marcel Breuer deliberately designed it to have no right angles, in response to criticism by his detractors that his architecture was too rigid. **The furniture** inside – altar, wooden pews, bronze chandelier – were also designed by him, in keeping with his **pure, functional vision**.



Inclined lift n°1 – a combination of functionality and design

Introduced in 1976, the inclined lift n°1 is still in operation today. Designed to connect two of the resort's natural levels separated by embankments and cliffs, it blends into the landscape by following the terrain's natural incline. Its orange cabin, designed by the Marcel Breuer agency in New York, adds a vibrant, graphic touch to the surrounding architecture, while ensuring a fluid transition between Flaine Forêt and Flaine Forum. A connector that's both technically and aesthetically pleasing!

A practical cable car station

Smart! To make skiers' lives easier and avoid them having to make awkward journeys in ski boots, the DMC Flaine's lower station was designed at "slope level". The underground engine room frees up space on the surface and enables smoother **integration with the landscape**. This innovative approach illustrates the attention paid to day-to-day functionality in the resort planning.

Carefully considered exterior design, down to the very last detail

In Flaine, the level of attention paid to outdoor facilities plays a major role in the resort's aesthetic unity. Designed by Marcel Breuer himself, **the lighting** is an example of this, with glass globe lamps on the end of metallic rods, either vertical or affixed to the building facades, glowing with an understated, discreet light. At nightfall, these streetlamps reveal **the interplay of shadows and light on the diamond-**

point facades, elegantly underlining the surface of the concrete and the resort's unique visual identity.



The Wassily chair, a design icon by Marcel Breuer

Designed in 1925-1926 by Marcel Breuer when he headed up the Bauhaus metal workshop in Dessau, the Wassily chair – also known as model B3 – embodies the innovative spirit of the modern movement. Inspired by industrial techniques, Breuer designed a chair with stripped back lines that combined a tubular steel structure with tightly stretched leather straps. It went into serial production in the 1960s, and over the years became a classic that has been manufactured ever since. Today, it remains an emblematic symbol of 20th century design. An authentic Wassily chair is available to see at the Totem hotel.









"Head of a Woman" Pablo Picasso, 1991

This sculpture represents an illusionist's take in colour, relief, and substance, of the effects created by Pablo Picasso's artistry on his original "Head of a Woman". Located near the cable car and the Totem hotel, the sculpture can be seen from multiple different angles by skiers as they head off for the slopes from the Forum.

"Three Hexagons" Victor Vasarely, 1973

The 3 hexagons, poised on the roof of the shopping centre and visible from all over the resort, are a tribute to the Bauhaus movement, using its palette of primary colours.

The artist gives the impression that we are seeing cubes within cubes... formed from multiple squares, but only an illusion of depth created on a two-dimensional surface.

"The Copse of 7 Trees" Jean Dubuffet, 1988

The Copse of 7 Trees, painted in black and white, reprises the 'Hourloupe' style, creating a monumental work of art perched in the heart of Flaine Forum. They interact both with "real" nature, and the geometric architecture of Marcel Breuer, going by the names of "The Butterfly, the Bulb, the Great Lobed One, the Antennae, the Bent One, the Two-Dimensional-Opened Out Tree, and the Sun".

"Rope Imprints" Vera Cardot, 1986

In Flaine Forêt, the raw concrete facades of three buildings designed by Marcel Breuer are a canvas for discreet rope imprints. Created by Vera Cardot, a French artist of Hungarian origin, the imprints take the shape of the constellations after which they are named: Balance (Libra), Bélier (Aries) and Capricorne. Subtle and poetic, these embedded artworks can be seen by skiers heading towards the slopes.

"Fountain in the Auditorium" Pol Bury, 1986

The spheres of the Auditorium fountain, moved by the water, stir in immutable and almost perpetual motion, while a curtain of water forms around the top of the bowl. They grace the hall of the auditorium, marking time like a pendulum...

"Bundles of Stainless Steel Rods" Davos Hanich, 1970-1971

You only have to look up to see this artwork by French sculptor and painter Davos Hanich. Commissioned by Éric and Sylvie Boissonnas, this discreet piece connects the concrete pillars in Flaine Forum using stainless steel rods. Suspended in space, these bundles of metallic rods create an interplay of moving shadows on the rigid surfaces.

On the slopes: La Pente à Jules

Open during the day, La Pente à Jules restaurant welcomes skiers to a relaxed atmosphere with a large selection of delicious dishes. Whether on the sunny terrace or inside the restaurant, settle in for a gourmet lunch bursting with local flavour. Those in a rush to hit the slopes again will love the "Jules Express" service, with burgers, bruschetta, wraps and other homemade snacks to nibble on between two ski runs!

The most surprising: Sabaudia

Located in Flaine Forêt, just opposite inclined lift $n^\circ 1$, Sabaudia might not leap out at you at first glance, but behind its discreet façade, this welcoming restaurant has a wonderful surprise in store for foodies. In a warm atmosphere created by an attentive team, the varied menu offers generous homemade cooking inspired by cuisines from around the world.

The most elegant: Le Bauhaus

Housed on the ground floor of Hôtel Alhéna in Flaine Forum, Le Bauhaus combines traditional Alpine dishes with flavours of the sea. With its relaxed setting and elegant decor, the restaurant is open non-stop from lunch to dinner. With a selection of Savoyard specialities, seafood, meat dishes and French classics, you'll be spoiled for choice!

The oldest: Le Michet

Housed in an authentic hundred-year-old sheepfold, Le Michet offers inventive cuisine combining Savoyard tradition, French gastronomy and inspirations from around the world. The lunch menu caters to skiers who are keen to get back out on the slopes, with promptly served quality dishes, enjoyed on the terrace or at cosy fireside tables. In the evening, it exudes a more intimate atmosphere, with a gastronomic menu designed for a gourmet getaway. Located in Flaine Forum, at the foot of the slopes, the restaurant is accessible on skis... and is just a five minute walk away.

In winter, the mountain experience extends to the dinner table. Whether it's generous cuisine served on a terrace, specialities with a slopeside twist, restaurants with a lively atmosphere, or a gournet break between

two ski runs, there's a spot for everyone!

On the go: Ali-B

Located in Flaine Forêt, Ali-B puts a fresh, ethical twist on fast food. Whether you're dining in or taking away, it serves delicious homemade food, including wraps, buckwheat pancakes, sweet treats and coffees to enjoy at any time of day. Here, flavour goes hand in hand with sustainability, with glass bottles or cartons replacing plastic, which you won't find here at all, and a percentage of profits made on certain drinks donated to charity. Ali-B is both practical, tasty and socially responsible.


Savour winter in a cosy ephemeral cocoon
